Pacific Gas and Electric Company (the Company) hereby submits notice pursuant to General Order (G.O.) 131-D, Section XI, Subsection B.4, of the construction of facilities that are exempt from a Permit to Construct.

Purpose

This advice letter provides a copy of the Notice of Proposed Construction (Attachment I) and the Notice Distribution List, which comply with the noticing requirements found in G.O. 131-D, Section XI.

Background

The Company plans to reconductor (replace electric wires on) its 12.1-mile Eastshore to San Mateo 230 kilovolt (kV) Power Line (placing of new conductors on supporting structures already built) between the Company's Eastshore and San Mateo substations in order to increase its electric transmission system's ability to transmit electrical power from planned electric generation projects proposed within the limits of the City of Hayward. The Eastshore to San Mateo 230 kV Power Line runs westerly from Eastshore Substation, which is located south of Investment Boulevard and west of Corporate Avenue in Hayward, crosses Corporate Avenue, enters commercial property for a distance of about 2000 feet, and then crosses salt ponds for about 1.5 miles before crossing the San Francisco Bay for 7.3 miles just southerly of the San Mateo-Hayward Bridge. The line continues westerly through Foster City for about one mile and then northwesterly for 1.8 miles along Third Avenue in the City of San Mateo, then crosses into open space lands along the San Francisco Bay Trail and Shoreline Park for one mile to San Mateo Substation located east of State Highway 101 and south of East Poplar Avenue in San Mateo. In order to maintain the proper wire-to-ground clearance, the Company plans to raise approximately nine of the existing 48 towers by approximately 11 to 16.5 feet. In addition, at Eastshore Substation, the Company will replace one 146-foot tall lattice tower with one or two structures of roughly similar height (replacement of existing supporting structures).

Construction activities are scheduled to begin in July, 2008, or as soon as possible thereafter, and project completion is scheduled for January, 2009, or as soon as possible thereafter.

CPUC General Order 131-D, Section III, A, exempts projects meeting specific conditions from the CPUC's requirement to file an application requesting authority to construct. The Company believes this project qualifies for the following exemptions:

- "The placing of new or additional conductors, insulators, or their accessories on supporting structures already built."
- "The replacement of existing power line facilities or supporting structures with equivalent facilities or structures."

Additionally, G.O. 131-D requires utilities to employ "no cost" and specified "low cost" measures to reduce public exposure to electric and magnetic fields (EMFs) in accordance with California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) Decision 93-11-013 and Pacific Gas and Electric Company's "EMF Design Guidelines of New Electrical Facilities: Transmission, Substation, and Distribution." The following measures are proposed for this project:

- PG&E will raise one tower approximately ten feet taller than would otherwise be necessary where the power line passes near a daycare center in order to reduce EMF levels at ground level.

This filing will not increase any rate or charge, cause the withdrawal of service, or conflict with any other rate schedule or rule.

PROJECT NAME: Eastshore to San Mateo 230 kV Power Line Reconducting Project (Alameda and San Mateo Counties)
ADVICE LETTER NUMBER: 3120-E

Proposed Project: Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) plans to reconductor (replace electric wires on) its 12.1-mile Eastshore to San Mateo 230 kilovolt (kV) Power Line (placing of new conductors on supporting structures already built) between PG&E's Eastshore and San Mateo substations in order to increase its electric transmission system's ability to transmit electrical power from planned electric generation projects proposed within the limits of the City of Hayward. The Eastshore to San Mateo 230 kV Power Line runs westerly from Eastshore Substation, which is located south of Investment Boulevard and west of Corporate Avenue in Hayward, crosses Corporate Avenue, enters commercial property for a distance of about 2000 feet, and then crosses salt ponds for about 1.5 miles before crossing the San Francisco Bay for 7.3 miles just southerly of the San Mateo-Hayward Bridge. The line continues westerly through Foster City for about one mile and then northwesterly for 1.8 miles along Third Avenue in the City of San Mateo, then crosses into open space lands along the San Francisco Bay Trail and Shoreline Park for one mile to San Mateo Substation located east of State Highway 101 and south of East Poplar Avenue in San Mateo. In order to maintain the proper wire-to-ground clearance, PG&E plans to raise approximately nine of the existing 48 towers by approximately 11 to 16.5 feet. In addition, at Eastshore Substation, PG&E will replace one 146-foot tall lattice tower with one or two structures of roughly similar height (replacement of existing supporting structures). Construction activities are scheduled to begin in July, 2008, or as soon as possible thereafter, and project completion is scheduled for January, 2009, or as soon as possible thereafter.

Electric and Magnetic Fields (EMF): Pacific Gas and Electric Company will employ "no cost" and specified "low cost" measures to reduce public exposure to EMF in accordance with California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) Decision 93-11-013 and Pacific Gas and Electric Company's "EMF Design Guidelines of New Electrical Facilities: Transmission, Substation, and Distribution." The following measures are proposed for this project:

- PG&E will raise one tower approximately ten feet taller than would otherwise be necessary where the power line passes near a daycare center in order to reduce EMF levels at ground level.

Exemption from CPUC Permit Requirement: CPUC General Order 131-D, Section III, A, exempts projects meeting specific conditions from the CPUC's requirement to file an application requesting authority to construct. PG&E Co. believes this project qualifies for the following exemptions:

- "The placing of new or additional conductors, insulators, or their accessories on supporting structures already built."
- "The replacement of existing power line facilities or supporting structures with equivalent facilities or structures."

Public Review Process: Persons or groups may protest the proposed construction if they believe that Pacific Gas and Electric Company has incorrectly applied for an exemption or that the conditions set out in Section III.B.1 of General Order 131-D exist;
