## ENHANCING WILDFIRE PREVENTION EFFORTS TO KEEP YOU SAFE

To keep our communities safe, we are improving our system and using advanced safety tools:

ENHANCED POWERLINE SAFETY SETTINGS (EPSS) automatically turn off power if there is a hazard, like a tree branch falling into a powerline. This may result in an unplanned outage where we are unable to notify you in advance.

Last year we saw an:

**80%** reduction in ignitions on EPSS-enabled lines.\*

\*Reduction in CPUC-reportable ignitions on EPSS-enabled lines in High Fire-Threat Districts, compared to the prior 3-year average, as of December 31, 2021.

## **PUBLIC SAFETY POWER SHUTOFFS**

(PSPS) are proactive, targeted outages used to prevent wildfires. You will be notified in advance.

These are used along with other efforts like undergrounding, system hardening, vegetation management and more.
