Important update about electric rates

Throughout the year, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) submits requests to the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to change our rates. On February 27, 2026, PG&E submitted Advice Letter 7846-E to decrease bundled electric rates on March 1, 2026.

PREVIOUS Residential Bundled Non-CARE Average Rate as of **January 1, 2026**: 41.46 cents per kilowatt-hour.

NEW Residential Bundled Non-CARE Average Rate as of **March 1, 2026**: 40.60 cents per kilowatt-hour.

Estimated electric bill impacts effective March 1, 2026¹

A bundled customer is one who receives both their electric delivery and electric generation from PG&E. Average residential monthly bill impacts for a typical bundled customer are shown below:

Average Non-CARE residential electric bill (500 kilowatt-hours)	\$202.65	-\$5.14	-2.5%	\$197.51
Average CARE residential electric bill (500 kilowatt-hours)	\$121.76	-\$10.37	-8.5%	\$111.39

Customers enrolled in the CARE program receive a discount of approximately 42% on their electric bills.³


Why are rates decreasing?

The primary drivers of the March 1, 2026, decrease are as follows:

- Recovery of costs relating to the 2021 Wildfire Mitigation and Catastrophic Events (WMCE) and 2023 Wildfire Mitigation and Catastrophic Events (WMCE) proceedings has ended, resulting in a net decrease of \$499.5 million out of rates.
- PG&E is implementing the Base Services Charge (BSC), which reduces per kilowatt-hour rates for all residential customers. Net bill impacts vary by customer type, but the structure of the BSC provides higher overall discounts to CARE customers.

How are rates set?

Rates are set through a regulatory process with the CPUC. The process includes opportunities for the public to attend hearings and/or provide comments. A simplified diagram of the process is shown below.
