



### Important update about gas rates

Throughout the year, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) submits requests to the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to change our rates. On February 23, 2026, PG&E submitted Advice Letter 5184-G<sup>1</sup> updating gas rates effective March 1, 2026. PG&E's bundled residential average gas CARE rates will increase by approximately \$0.006, representing a 0.3% increase for the typical CARE customer and Non-CARE rates will increase by approximately \$0.008, representing a 0.3% increase.

**PREVIOUS** Residential Bundled CARE and Non-CARE Rates<sup>2</sup> as of **January 1, 2026**, were \$2.205 and \$2.784 per therm.

**NEW** Residential Bundled CARE and Non-CARE Rates<sup>3</sup> as of **March 1, 2026**, are \$2.211 and \$2.792 per therm.

Customers enrolled in the CARE program receive a discount of approximately 20% on their gas bill.


### Why are rates increasing?

The primary driver for the March 1, 2026, rate increase is:

The filing of Advice Letter 5184-G increases rates to reflect the recovery of costs associated with the 2023 Wildfire Mitigation and Catastrophic Event (WMCE) CPUC Decision 26-02-004. The WMCE account tracks costs for wildfire mitigation, catastrophic events, the COVID pandemic, disconnections, climate adaptation, and other matters.

### How are rates set?

Rates are set through a regulatory process with the CPUC. The process includes opportunities for the public to attend hearings and/or provide comment. A simplified diagram of the process is shown below.
