00:01:02:19 - 00:01:04:08 The idea of creating an escape plan

00:01:04:08 - 00:01:05:29 makes me a little nervous.

00:01:05:29 - 00:01:08:25 It's intimidating to think about evacuating with my family.

00:01:08:25 - 00:01:10:18 That's totally understandable, Alicia,

00:01:10:18 - 00:01:12:02

but going over these steps will take

00:01:12:02 - 00:01:14:06 some of the uncertainty out of the equation.

00:01:14:06 - 00:01:15:21 Great, so what's the first step?

00:01:15:21 - 00:01:16:28 You should start by making sure

00:01:16:28 - 00:01:19:11 that you have an escape route to get out of your house,

00:01:19:11 - 00:01:21:09 as well as get out of your community

00:01:21:09 - 00:01:23:15 as quickly and safely as possible.

00:01:23:15 - 00:01:25:11 We're familiar with our home exits,

00:01:25:11 - 00:01:28:13 but what do we need to know about evacuating our community?

00:01:28:13 - 00:01:30:16 Making a detailed plan can make all the difference

00:01:30:16 - 00:01:31:12 in an emergency.

00:01:31:12 - 00:01:33:17 Wildfires can spread very quickly and it's possible

00:01:33:17 - 00:01:36:28 that you'll have little to no warning of an evacuation.

00:01:36:28 - 00:01:38:26 That's why it's so important to map out a plan

00:01:38:26 - 00:01:41:12 to exit your neighborhood as well as your community.

00:01:41:12 - 00:01:44:00 Some communities have designated evacuation plans

00:01:44:00 - 00:01:45:06 to help guide you.

00:01:45:06 - 00:01:46:28 Check with local public safety officials.

00:01:46:28 - 00:01:50:08 It's a good idea to practice evacuating every few months

00:01:50:08 - 00:01:51:29 during both day and night.

00:01:51:29 - 00:01:54:15 Okay, well, I know my roads in my community,

00:01:54:15 - 00:01:56:20 but what are the steps to making sure my evacuation routes

00:01:56:20 - 00:01:59:02 are mapped out correctly?

00:01:59:02 - 00:02:00:00 I'm glad you asked.

00:02:00:00 - 00:02:02:13 Ideally, you should have two evacuation routes

00:02:02:13 - 00:02:05:01

out of your neighborhood as well as out of your community,

00:02:05:01 - 00:02:06:26 in case one is cut off by fire.

00:02:06:26 - 00:02:08:07 And check to see if your community

00:02:08:07 - 00:02:10:18 has any designated public assembly points.

00:02:10:18 - 00:02:13:06 What are some examples of common public assembly points?

00:02:13:06 - 00:02:15:09 Churches, schools, other spots that are large enough

00:02:15:09 - 00:02:17:16 to give people shelter during a wildfire.

00:02:17:16 - 00:02:20:00 These are often barriers, like large parking lots,

00:02:20:00 - 00:02:21:15 which resist fires.

00:02:21:15 - 00:02:23:16 So now we know why it's so important

00:02:23:16 - 00:02:25:05 to create a plan in advance.

00:02:25:05 - 00:02:26:19 Yes, practice makes perfect.

00:02:26:19 - 00:02:28:23 This is especially important for children and pets.

00:02:33:00 - 00:02:35:03

So we just learned about evacuating.

00:02:35:03 - 00:02:36:03 When it's time to go,

00:02:36:03 - 00:02:38:13 what do I need to make sure we bring with us?

00:02:38:13 - 00:02:40:06 Every family should have an emergency kit

00:02:40:06 - 00:02:42:00 or go bag with critical items

00:02:42:00 - 00:02:45:04 for every member of your household, including pets.

00:02:45:04 - 00:02:46:14 What are the essential items

00:02:46:14 - 00:02:48:20 every emergency kit should have?

00:02:48:20 - 00:02:49:27 Let's start with people.

00:02:49:27 - 00:02:52:15 You should pack sufficient supplies for 72 hours.

00:02:52:15 - 00:02:54:20 That means water, non-perishable food,

00:02:54:20 - 00:02:57:06 flashlights with batteries, clothing,

00:02:57:06 - 00:03:00:20 critical medications, important documents, and cash.

00:03:00:20 - 00:03:02:25
What about your furrier family/friends,

00:03:02:25 - 00:03:05:22 you know, our pets, what do they need?

00:03:05:22 - 00:03:07:02 Pet should have their own go bag

00:03:07:02 - 00:03:10:00 with 72 hours worth of food, water, medicine,

00:03:10:00 - 00:03:13:09 medical records, leash with sanitation wipes, pet toys,

00:03:13:09 - 00:03:15:02 and a picture of you with your pet

00:03:15:02 - 00:03:17:15 in the event that you are separated.

00:03:17:15 - 00:03:20:18 Keep pet carriers, leashes, and emergency kits close to exits

00:03:20:18 - 00:03:23:14 so that you can easily grab them on your way out.

00:03:23:14 - 00:03:27:06 You can go to safetyactioncenter.pge.com

00:03:27:06 - 00:03:29:07 and download your emergency kit checklist

00:03:29:07 - 00:03:31:09 and learn more preparedness tips.

00:03:31:09 - 00:03:34:14 Creating an emergency kit sounds actually pretty easy.

00:03:34:14 - 00:03:35:17 Exactly, Alicia.

00:03:39:08 - 00:03:41:08 It feels good to have a plan, David,

00:03:41:08 - 00:03:44:14 so what's our third and final task for this episode?

00:03:48:20 - 00:03:51:15 Where should folks go to sign up for emergency alerts?

00:03:54:01 - 00:03:56:15 and warning software to alert residents via phone,

00:03:56:15 - 00:03:58:26 cell phone, text, and/or email.

00:04:00:18 - 00:04:02:02 to learn how to sign up for alerts.

00:04:02:02 - 00:04:04:21 PG&E also has their own alert system that lets you know
