Bringing our tribe, bringing our people, back together so we can live together as a tribe, community, and most importantly, a family again. That's the vision with the Lytton Rancheria homeland.

PG&E has been partnering with the Lytton Rancheria since the inception of this amazing project. Really, the tribal members returning home for the first time in 60 years.

This project is reconductoring around a mile and a half of line to allow reliability and capacity for the tribal community out here in Windsor.

It's a pinnacle time for our tribe in Lytton rights history as we navigate through this process of bringing members into their new homes.

This has been a four-year project to build a 146-home development. And we've completed it, and now we're at the stage of moving tribal members in to the single family homes, townhomes, and senior cottages.

For this project, the circuit out here actually did not have enough line capacity, so we had to come in and upgrade all the facilities here.

Since it's a mile and a half, it does take a long time to replace all the conductor, all the poles, all the transformers, and all the equipment.

So this project was broken into two phases. Phase one took place in the fall. It allowed for the wastewater to get online, allowed for the homes to be built and energized, and has now allowed them to move in. Phase II will be the completion of the project, which will get everything up and running prior to that summer peak load.

The team worked closely with the tribe to ensure that we met their needed timelines for the tribal members to move home.

The guys really love this type of work. We're going to have the capacity to grow this town and make it even better and support other communities like this one.

When we make a promise, we're going to keep a promise, and we're going to prioritize our customers. It feels great being able to see how the money from our rate case actually comes down into a local community. It helps build out something as important as the Lytton Rancheria, but also allows us to build out our circuits, improve reliability, and allow a town like Windsor to utilize our service in ways that expand all the things that they find important.

When we think about an electric capacity project, we think about building out for the grid of the future to support electrification, to support electric vehicles, which are very important, but it also supports new housing developments, like this one, and has very real and meaningful impacts for the community.

With PG&E's partnership, the tribe was able to fulfill its commitment to the tribal members to provide housing.
