Subject: Notice of Proposed Construction of Facilities Pursuant to General Order 131-D, Keswick-Trinity-Weaverville 60kV Pole Replacement, Counties of Shasta and Trinity

Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) hereby submits notice pursuant to General Order (G.O.) 131-D, Section XI, Subsection B.4, of the construction of facilities that are exempt from a Permit to Construct.

Purpose

This advice letter provides a copy of the Notice of Proposed Construction (Attachment I) and the Notice Distribution List, which comply with the noticing requirements found in G.O. 131-D, Section XI.

Background

In order to provide reliable transmission service and reduce the risk of outages in its service area, PG&E proposes to replace approximately 40 wood poles (replacement of existing facilities) along the existing Keswick-Trinity-Weaverville 60kV Power Line within Shasta and Trinity Counties (existing easement). The existing wood poles, which have been recently tested and found in need of replacement; will be replaced with approximately 5 - to 10 - foot taller wood poles to maintain sufficient distance between the ground and lower distribution lines as required by the California Public Utility Commission's General Order 95. The replacement work will begin at a pole approximately 1.3 miles west of Keswick Substation (northwest of Redding) just north of Rock Creek Road and extends approximately 26 miles in a north westerly direction towards Weaverville Substation in Weaverville. The power line extends parallel to and adjacent to State Highway 299 for approximately 7 miles along the eastern shore of Whiskeytown Lake; another power line is also located in the same corridor for this segment of the project. The power line then leaves Hwy 299, extends roughly parallel to Highway 299 in a northerly direction (maximum separation of approximately 6.5 miles) and then rejoins Hwy 299 near the last pole replacement location, just southeast of Weaverville. Construction is proposed to begin October 2009 or as soon as possible

thereafter, and project completion is scheduled for December 2010 or as soon as possible thereafter.

This project qualifies as exempt from Permit to Construct filing requirements, pursuant to G.O. 131-D, Section III, B.1, which states that a Permit to Construct is not required for;

- “The replacement of existing power line facilities or supporting structures with equivalent facilities or structures.”
- “Power line facilities or substations to be located in an existing franchise, road-widening setback easement, or public utility easement; or in a utility corridor designated, precisely mapped and officially adopted pursuant to law by federal, state, or local agencies for which a final Negative Declaration or EIR finds no significant unavoidable environmental impacts.”



Proposed Project: In order to provide reliable transmission service and reduce the risk of outages in its service area, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) proposes to replace approximately 40 wood poles (replacement of existing facilities) along the existing Keswick-Trinity-Weaverville 60kV Power Line within Shasta and Trinity Counties (existing easement). The existing wood poles, which have been recently tested and found in need of replacement, will be replaced with approximately 5- to 10- foot taller wood poles to maintain sufficient distance between the ground and lower distribution lines as required by the California Public Utility Commission's General Order 95. Exemption from CPUC Permit Requirement: CPUC General Order 131-D, Section III, B.1, exempts projects meeting specific conditions from the CPUC's requirement to file an application requesting authority to construct. Pacific Gas and Electric Company believes this project qualifies for the following exemption(s):

- b) The replacement of existing power line facilities or supporting structures with equivalent facilities or structures.
- g) Power line facilities or substations to be located in an existing franchise road-widening setback easement, or public utility easement; or in a utility corridor designated, precisely mapped and officially adopted pursuant to law by federal, state, or local agencies for which a final Negative Declaration or EIR finds no significant unavoidable environmental impacts.

Public Review Process: Persons or groups may protest the proposed construction if they believe that Pacific Gas and Electric Company has incorrectly applied for an exemption or that the conditions set out in Section III.B.2 of General Order 131-D exist;

- a. There is reasonable possibility that the activity may have an impact on an environmental resource of hazardous or critical concern where designated, precisely mapped and officially adopted pursuant to law by federal, state, or local agencies; or
- b. The cumulative impact of successive projects of the same type in the same place, over time, is significant; or
- c. There is a reasonable possibility that the activity will have a significant effect on the environment due to unusual circumstances.

Protests should include the following:

1. Your name, mailing address and daytime telephone number.
2. Reference to the CPUC Advice Letter Number and Project Name.
3. A clear description of the reason for the protest.
4. Whether you believe that evidentiary hearings are necessary to resolve factual disputes.
