## ✓ GRANTEES

As communities across PG&E’s service territory face ongoing COVID-19 impacts, PG&E and The PG&E Corporation Foundation proactively supported organizations at county and local levels by providing financial support as organizations identified urgent and long-term needs for those most in need.

General Relief

PG&E and The PG&E Corporation Foundation provided **over \$590K in charitable contributions to more than 25 local community foundations** across our entire service territory toward general relief efforts, such as support for low-income individuals and families, schools and small businesses.

## Food Security for Vulnerable Communities

PG&E and The PG&E Corporation Foundation contributed **\$150K to Meals on Wheels and other organizations** providing healthy meals for older adults in more than 20 counties.

PG&E contributed **\$150K to California Association of Food Banks** to establish the California Food Bank Rapid Response Fund. This fund provides critical funding for 32 food banks across PG&E's service territory to increase their capacity to purchase food and supplies and supplement staffing needs.



## Small Businesses



PG&E provided **\$50K to Kiva, a non-profit organization that expands financial access to help underserved communities and small businesses thrive.** In response to COVID-19, Kiva revised its funding platform to support small businesses in the U.S. by providing easy access to affordable capital necessary to remain open.

## Education and Youth Development



The PG&E Corporation Foundation partnered with the Warriors Community Foundation, the charitable arm of the Golden State Warriors, to provide a **\$100K grant for urgent and long-term support of youth development and education programs.** This contribution will help 10 Bay Area non-profits assist youth with summer programming and academic support to lessen the impact from pandemic-related school closures and bridge gaps in technology access to support remote learning.

## IN-KIND DONATIONS

In the early days of the state's response to the pandemic, PG&E reviewed on-hand emergency supplies to support frontline healthcare workers and first responders and bolstered the supply of critical safety equipment with donations of personal protective equipment. These donations mirror the mutual assistance that utility companies provide to each other during emergency response for storms, earthquakes and fires.

## EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

- **PG&E continued its sponsorship of the 211 program** (211) to help communities in times of disaster. 211 is a free, confidential calling and texting service that connects people across California with local health and social service resources. 211 reduces the number of non-emergency calls to 911 and plays a critical role in providing information and support related to the current COVID-19 pandemic, Public Safety Power Shutoff events, as well as disasters such as wildfires.
  - **PG&E also partnered with Bay Area sports teams, including the Oakland A's and San Jose Earthquakes, to share information about 211.**
- **PG&E contributed \$50K to the American Red Cross Coronavirus Outbreak fund**, which provides communities across our service territory with vital blood and disaster services in the midst of this public health emergency.

## PG&E EMPLOYEE ENGAGEMENT AND VOLUNTEERISM

### Campaign for the Community (CFTC)

The PG&E Corporation Foundation matched, dollar for dollar, employee contributions to the COVID-19 Relief Campaign. As a result, PG&E employees gave more than **\$50K**, resulting in more than **\$100K in donations supporting the following organizations' COVID-19 relief efforts:**

### Virtual Volunteerism

The safety of employees and communities is our highest priority. Aligned with directives from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention regarding COVID-19 guidelines, PG&E paused company-sponsored in-person volunteerism and identified ways for employees to volunteer virtually, including:

#### Meals on Wheels Senior Calls

Due to COVID-19, Meals on Wheels clients faced extreme isolation during shelter-at-home orders. To support Meals on Wheels, PG&E employee volunteers provided **550 wellness check-in calls to senior clients** resulting in meaningful human experiences.

 **80** Project in a Box

While sheltering at home, PG&E employees volunteered to **build 80 kits** that were donated to communities impacted by COVID-19.

- **Literacy Kits** were created and donated to local youth organizations and schools to help 1st through 3rd graders meet their reading and math literacy benchmarks.
- **Herb Garden Kits** were built as instructional kits for youth centers, schools and non-profit food assistance programs to help children and families learn what is needed to cultivate their own food.
- **Stuffed Animals** were stuffed by volunteers and donated to youth in local hospitals, shelters and housing organizations.
