Federal Government	American Jobs Act	Modernize schools, resilient and energy efficient schools, workforce development
California Energy Commission (CEC)	Bright Schools	Energy audits, feasibility studies, proposal review and more
California Energy Commission (CEC)	Energy Conservation Assistance Act	Zero interest loans for energy related projects
California Energy Commission (CEC)	Energy Partnership Program	Energy audits, feasibility studies, proposal review and more
California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank (I-Bank)	CA Lending for Energy and Environmental Needs (CLEEN) Program	Low interest loans made for all components of eligible projects
California Department of General Services (DGS)	Office of Public School Construction (OPSC)	School modernization and new school construction
California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC)	Self-Generation Incentive Program (SGIP)	Rebates for energy storage batteries
Pacific Gas and Electric (PGE)	Community Microgrid Enablement Program (CMEP)	Technical support and cost offsets for certain distribution system upgrades
Community Choice Aggregation	Community run energy delivery agency, overlays investor owned utility area*	SAMPLE: Marin Clean Energy (MCE) battery storage program
School Districts	General Obligation Bonds - approved by local voters for facilities projects	Voters approve an incremental additional property tax amount for a period of time to repay bonds that fund projects
Power Purchase Agreements	Private financing	All elements of the resiliency project owned and operated by the investor
