Pacific Gas and Electric Company ("PG&E" or "the Company") hereby submits notice pursuant to General Order (G.O.) 131-D, Section XI, Subsection B.4, of the construction of facilities that are exempt from a Permit to Construct.

Purpose

This advice letter provides a copy of the Notice of Proposed Construction (Attachment I) and the Notice Distribution List, which comply with the noticing requirements found in G.O. 131-D, Section XI.

Background

To accommodate the replacement and realignment of Cottonwood Creek Bridge, located at post mile 15.41 on State Route 99, in Butte County (larger project) the State of California, Department of Transportation (Caltrans) has requested Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) to relocate approximately 0.7 miles of the existing Table Mountain-Peachton 60 Kilovolt (kV) Power Line. PG&E will relocate and replace approximately 11 existing wood poles (approximately 42 to 56 feet tall) with approximately 11 Light Duty Steel (LDS) poles (approximately 48 to 58 feet tall). PG&E will also interset 9 new structures, one LDS pole (approximately 48 feet tall) and two wood poles (approximately 70 feet tall); 6 shoo-fly structures will be temporarily put in place (approximately 50 to 70 feet tall) and two existing structures will be reframed. Height increases are required to comply with California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) General Order 95 minimum ground-to-conductor clearance requirements, while accommodating Caltrans State Route 99 proposed improvements, electric distribution wires, and future communication wires on the power line poles (underbuild).

The project begins at an existing PG&E wood power pole on State Route 99 located approximately 0.6 miles south of the intersection of State Route 99 with Nelson Shippee Road and continues along State Route 99 south approximately 1.66 miles to an existing PG&E wood power pole on State Route 99 that is located approximately 0.83 miles north of the intersection of State Route 99 with State Route 162. Construction is tentatively scheduled to begin May 2020, or as soon as practicable after project approval. Construction is anticipated to be completed June 2022, or as soon as possible after construction begins.

CPUC General Order 131-D, Section III, Subsection B.1 exempts projects meeting specific conditions from the CPUC's requirement to file an application requesting authority to construct. The Company believes this project qualifies for the following exemption(s),

f. "power lines or substations to be relocated or constructed which have undergone environmental review pursuant to CEQA as part of a larger project, and for which the final CEQA document (Environmental Impact Report or Negative Declaration) finds no significant unavoidable environmental impacts caused by the proposed line or substation."

Caltrans adopted an Initial Study with Mitigated Negative Declaration for the Cottonwood Creek Bridge Replacement Project, finding no significant unavoidable environmental impacts resulting from PG&E's required utility relocations (State Clearinghouse # 2017102021), CEQA MND document link<http://www.dot.ca.gov/dist3/departments/envinternet/cottonwoodcreekbridge/cottonwoodcreek.html>.

This advice letter will not cause the withdrawal of service, or conflict with any other rate schedule or rule.

Protests

- The cumulative impact of successive projects of the same type in the same place, over time, is significant; or
- There is a reasonable possibility that the activity will have a significant effect on the environment due to unusual circumstances.

Protests should include the following:

- Your name, mailing address and daytime telephone number.
- Reference to the CPUC Advice Letter Number and Project Name.
- A clear description of the reason for the protest.
- Whether you believe that evidentiary hearings are necessary to resolve factual disputes.
