Community Wildfire Safety Program PG&E Virtual Safety Town Hall – Alpine, Amador, Calaveras, Mariposa and Tuolumne Counties

Post-Event Report

May 18, 2021

On May 5, 2021, PG&E held an online safety town hall, in accordance with the Settlement Agreement approved by the May 7, 2020, California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) Decision (D.) 20-05-019 Order Instituting Investigation (OII) regarding 2017 and 2018 wildfires.

PG&E is listening to customer feedback to help understand how we can continue to improve wildfire prevention efforts, including the Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) program. The purpose of the event was to share safety, utility service-related information and customer resources for Alpine, Amador, Calaveras, Mariposa and Tuolumne county residents, gather input and respond to questions. Due to COVID-19 health and safety guidelines, the safety town hall was conducted virtually.

The event featured a 30-minute presentation on PG&E's wildfire prevention plans, an overview of 2020 Public Safety Power Shutoff events and weather-related safety tips, followed by a 30-minute Q&A session. Participants could either join via the virtual conference platform or by calling into a toll-free number. Closed captioning was available in English, Spanish and Chinese.

Event Outreach

PG&E conducted outreach through a variety of channels to drive attendance to the event. Outreach included:

- Approximately 41,019 email invitations sent to all electric customers with an email address in Alpine, Amador, Calaveras, Mariposa and Tuolumne counites
- Social media postings on Facebook and Instagram
- Media advisory
- Outreach to city, county and tribal officials as well as community-based organizations

Question and Answer Session Summary

Throughout the town hall, participants submitted questions and comments for PG&E's subject matter experts through a Q&A function on the virtual webinar platform. A total of 33 questions and comments were received.

The Q&A portion focused on the following themes:

- Vegetation Management
 - Wood management practices
 - Defensible space around homes and roadways
 - How to report a tree or branch touching a power line
 - How to request expanded enhanced vegetation management in Amador County
- Generator rebate program
- Definition of system hardening and where customers can find local progress updates
- How the high fire-threat areas are determined
- Electric vehicle charging pilot at Customer Resource Centers
- How sectionalizing may mitigate outages in Tuolumne County
- PG&E weather stations and high-definition cameras





- We received 125 Goal Zero Yeti 1500x's last Friday 4/30/21 and are set and are readying ourselves for distribution. :-)
- Can you please share the link?
- Thank you!
- Can you define, "hardening lines"?
- They are currently "hardening" our neighborhood it's not what they promised.
- How do you determine where the highest fire-threat areas are?
- Why are there no sectionalizing devices in Tuolumne County?
- Are the cameras continuously monitored?
- This is BS you've been given to read why not take unvetted calls. You guys are currently screwing over our street.
- How can I directly discuss with a (PG&E Employee) hardening distribution assets and changing non-exempt equipment to Exempt Hardware on Tier 2 private property in Amador County?
- If I have a tree or branch touching a power line, what is the best way to contact PG&E to have them check/cut the tree/branch?
- Is there an opportunity to exponentially expand the EVM work in Amador County? Only 2 miles planned in Amador County in 2021. Can you share how we can expand and accelerate this important vegetation management work in Amador County?
- That is awesome, we are planning to add the other CBO's information with the materials that we distribute to those that receive resources directly from us and the informational handouts we distribute at the CRCs.
- Any help with financing to purchase a generator, so we will have power during outages?
- Would you give the link regarding your disability program? Thanks.
- Another good informative session.
- The weather maps, camera etc. are awesome.
- Look forward to the pilot app coming out also isn't there a pilot program for EV charging at CRCs?
- My experience of the PSPS in Tuolumne County is that essentially the whole county is out. Will sectionalizing help that?
- Why doesn't PG&E have any concerns with the leaf/needles and broken dead limbs under your lines? Seems to be a broken live line would ignite this type of debris.
- Where can I look at your system hardening plan, to figure out where in the hardening plan our home/address shows up?
- When large material is left in the home's defensible space, will PG&E move it?
- Thanx for doing this webinar it was very helpful!

- PG&E should look into using drones in addition to fixed cameras. A Bay Area company, called Skydio, has the exact drone PG&E should consider.
- Is PG&E or anyone removing trees, brush, dead foliage along dead end roads to assist with egress during a fire?
- We have had issues with trees dropped into a home's defensible space and it is left in large trunks that are very formidable for home owners to deal with.
- Regarding large wood left on premises, some areas have local charity groups that will come collect it and give it to seniors who need it.
- I believe leaving any large material in a defensible space is PG&E creating a danger and burdening residents. It also puts the homeowner into violation of PRC 4291. It has been happening frequently in Mariposa over the last few years.
- Wonderful presentation PG&E Team, you are much appreciated here at DRAIL! :-)
- That is a weak reply to putting people into danger and violation of PRC 4291. I asked about moving the material out of the defensible space.
- A homeowner can sign a paper allowing you to remove the trunks and logs. Using the "private property" excuse is weak.
- Thank you! Think he needs room in budget.
